AI-AP PRESENTS

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As a young photographer juggling artistic work with commercial assignments, John Goodman always had color slide film loaded in a camera. Beginning in the 1970s and through the late 1980s, he photographed on the streets of Boston, finding fleeting moments of connection at diners, shops and gas stations. He printed a few images, but packed most of his slides in a cabinet and only discovered them twenty-five years later, in 2009, when moving studios. Goodman, who would become known for his gritty series on New York's Times Square and

Boston's Combat Zone, revisits this early work for the first time in *not recent color*, at the Addison Gallery of American Art. A former student of Aperture editor Minor White, Goodman made images that, for curator Allison Kemmerer, are "piercing and often moving views of what it is to be human.
